





A model quartz mill as depicted in the July 23, 1864, issue of the *Mining and Scientific Press*. The upright portion of the mill, in the center of the picture, are the stamps, divided into four batteries of four stamps each. The stamps worked in a long iron mortar into which ore was fed from the front of the battery. The crushed ore passed through screens to the settling vats, a row of which can be seen in front of the batteries. A row of

separators sit below the vats. When the quicksilver had settled in the separators, it was drawn off into a suitable vessel by means of the tube shown in the engraving. It was then strained through thick canvas or buckskin, the gold remaining in the strainer in the form of a dry, hard "amalgam." The amalgam then placed in a retort, heated to drive off the mercury, leaving a hard, spongy mass of metal.

Articles of Agreement and Conventions
made and concluded at the Treaty Grounds at Hell Gate,
in the Bitter Root Valley this sixteenth day of July
in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty
five, by and between Isaac I. Stevens, Governor
and Superintendent of Indian Affairs for the Territory
of Washington on the part of the United States, and
the undersigned Chiefs, Head Men and Delegates
of the Confederate Tribes of the Flat Head, Kootenay,
and Upper Pend Oreille Indians on behalf of
and acting for said Confederate Tribes, and being
duly authorized thereto by them.

It being understood and agreed that the
said Confederate Tribes do hereby constitute a Nation
under the name of the Flat Head Nation, with Victor
the Head Chief of the Flat Head Tribe, as the Head
Chief of the said Nation, and that the several Chiefs,
Head Men and Delegates whose names are signed to
this Treaty, do hereby, in behalf of their respective
Tribes, recognize Victor as said Head Chief.

Article 1.

The said Confederate Tribes of Indians
hereby do relinquish and convey to the United
States all their right, title and interest in and
to the country occupied or claimed by them;












