Generating funds for your preservation project can often be the most daunting step in achieving your goal of a restored building. The Montana Preservation Alliance staff has compiled the list below to get you started. We also offer grant writing assistance for some projects and would be happy to have a discussion with you about which grants the best suit the needs of your project.

State Programs

Montana Historical Society

NEW! Historic Revitalization Subgrants: Revitalizing Montana's Rural Heritage

In Fall of 2019, MT SHPO was awarded funds from the National Park Service for historic preservation projects in communities under 50,000 in population. The total pool is \$350,000, and grants will range from \$10,000 - \$100,000. They will call for letters of Inquiry in late 2019, and will invite full applications from promising applicants. Funds must be matched 60:40, cash and/or in-kind. Projects from towns with active preservation programs are encouraged. Full details anticipated in November 2019.

State Historic Preservation Office: The Montana SHPO receives annual funding from the federal Historic Preservation Fund administered by the National Park Service. SHPO provides technical support and facilitates a variety of financial and tax incentives to encourage rehabilitation of historic buildings. When funding allows, SHPO also offers Brick and Mortar grants. These are infrequent due to funding levels. However, in recent years SHPO has offered small grants for barn preservation, matched 1:1, through cash or in-kind contributions.

Historic Preservation Investment Tax Credits: Montana's state agency that encourages the preservation of historic places. MT SHPO offers technical assistance and information on how to apply and qualify for federal and state historic preservation investment tax credits. Periodically they also have grant funding

Montana Department of Transportation (MDOT)

MDoT administers the Community Transportation Enhancement Program (CTEP), which funds projects under the National Intermodal Surface Transportation and Efficiency Act. The Act provides that 10% of all surface transportation funds be used for enhancement projects including historic preservation. In Montana, funds are distributed to the counties, which then re-grant these dollars for local enhancement projects under the CTEP program.

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Tax Increment Financing

Tax Increment Financing (TIF) is an economic development tool used to finance public infrastructure and stimulate private development within designated urban renewal areas (URA). Local governments in Montana to build partnerships with the private sector, and implement plans that revitalize specific areas within their communities must adopt URAs. TIF can fund capital improvements such as parks, streets, and transit systems that attract private investment, businesses, jobs, and residents. See:

Montana Arts Council

Montana Cultural Trust The state makes grants to cultural and aesthetic projects from interest earned in the investment of coal tax revenues in the Cultural Trust. Funds are available in operations, capital, special projects and endowment development categories for historic preservation activities. Applications are reviewed biannually by the Cultural and Aesthetic Projects Advisory Committee and approved by the Montana Legislature. Applications are due August 1 prior to the legislative session. Eligible applicants include local government and non-profit entities, state colleges and universities and Indian Tribes.

Montana Cultural Trust: National Endowment for the Arts

The Montana Arts Council also administers re-grant funds from the National Endowment for the Arts (NEA). Funds may be used for cultural resources planning, to sponsor activities related to arts and culture

Resource Indemnity Trust

The Montana Department of Natural Resources and Conservation makes grants from the Resource Indemnity Trust Fund every two years. Grants are reviewed by the DNRC and then referred to the Legislature for approval. Funds for this program come from severance taxes associated with mining activity in the state. Historic preservation projects that emphasize renewable resource management and community development are eligible. Applicants must be a unit of state government, such as a municipality, or an Indian Tribe.

Montana Department of Commerce (MDOC)

NEW! Montana Grants for Museums and Historic Sites

The Montana Legislature passed the Montana Museum's Act in 2019, which will fund new facilities for the Montana Historical Society along with grants for historic preservation. The MT Dept of Commerce is in process of writing the rules for these new funds, derived from a 1% addition to the MT Accommodations Tax. Funds will be awarded on a biennial basis, after approval by the Legislature. The first round of applications will be due by Feb 28, 2020.

Montana Tourism Grants

MT DoC funds tourism-related brick-and-mortar projects, such as construction costs associated with building new and/or rehabilitating older tourism and recreation attractions, historical sites or artifacts; costs associated with purchasing new and/or existing tourism and recreation attractions, historical sites or artifacts; and equipment purchased for tourism operations. Non-profit sponsors or local governments are eligible to apply. The funds are awarded on an annual basis through a competitive application process. Sponsors are required to invest \$1 for every \$2 in Tourism Grant funds received.

Community Development Block Grants (CDBG)

Montana's Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) Program is a competitive grant program designed to help communities of less than 50,000 population with their greatest community development needs. Great Falls and Billings receive CDBG funds on an entitlement basis. Other communities compete for funds under the Small Cities Program administered by the Montana Department of Commerce. The program was established by the federal Housing and Community Development Act of 1974 and is funded through the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD). All projects must principally benefit low and moderate-income persons and must be reviewed by SHPO. The basic categories for local community development projects are Economic Development, Housing, Public Facilities, and Planning Grants. The grant ceiling for housing or public facility projects is \$500,000, and \$15,000 for planning grants. *(For more frequent information of the CDGB grant opportunities we strongly recommend subscribing to their email update list.)*

Travel Montana

Travel Montana, a division within the Montana Department of Commerce, is charged with the development and promotion of tourism related economic development for the State of Montana. Funds are derived from Montana's "bed tax," an accommodations tax of 4% charged at Montana's lodging facilities.

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Travel Montana has a **Tourism Infrastructure Investment Program** which funds tourism-related brick-and-mortar projects, such as construction costs associated with building new and/or rehabilitating older tourism and recreation attractions, historical sites or artifacts; costs associated with purchasing new and/or existing tourism and recreation attractions, historical sites or artifacts; and equipment purchased for tourism operations. Application materials are available from Travel Montana in late spring of each year; the application deadline is August 1. Non-profit sponsors or local governments are eligible to apply. The funds are awarded on an annual basis through a competitive application process. Sponsors are required to invest \$1 for every \$2 in TIIP Grant funds received.

State Board of Investments

The Board of Investments' INTERCAP Program is a low cost, variable-rate program that lends money to Montana local governments for financing or refinancing the acquisition and installation of equipment or personal and real property and infrastructure improvements. The Board of Investments (BOI) Bond Program Office administers the program, issuing tax-exempt bonds and loans the proceeds to eligible borrowers. In addition to long-term financing, INTERCAP is an excellent source for interim financing.

Political subdivisions of state or local governments are eligible to apply; eligible projects include real property improvements, preliminary engineering, and grant writing work, interim financing for construction or cash-flow loans, and energy retrofit projects. Maximum loan amount per project depends on borrower's legal debt authority. The loan term can be 10 years or the useful life of the project, whichever is less. Money is always available, there is no funding cycle and funds are released on an ongoing basis as the project is completed.

Save America's Treasures

The Federal Save America's Treasures grants program began in 1999 and helps preserve nationally significant historic properties and collections that convey our nation's rich heritage to future generations of Americans.

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Preserve America

Preserve America provides funding to designated Preserve America Communities to support preservation efforts through heritage tourism, education, and historic preservation planning. Grants range from \$20,000 to \$250,000 and must be matched dollar for dollar with non-federal money. Public Law 11210, providing appropriations for Fiscal Year 2011, did not include funds for Preserve America grants. Therefore, NPS will not accept applications or award grants in FY 2011. The budget for FY 2012 is currently under review by Congress. NPS will post the status of FY 2012 funding when there is a change in the status of the FY2012 appropriations bill.

NHL Challenge Cost Share

The NPS Challenge Cost Share program funds projects that encourage the preservation of National Historic Landmarks throughout the country. Funding ranges from \$3,000 to \$30,000 per project. Must be matched dollar-for-dollar, cash or in-kind. Government entities and non-profit organizations are eligible to apply.

Historic Preservation Fund (HPF)

The Historic Preservation Fund, established in 1966, is part of the National Historic Preservation Act (NHPA). The National Park Service allocates a portion of this fund to the State Historic Preservation Offices (SHPO). In Montana, the HPF supports MTSHPO's program along with the 15 local governments with Certified Local Government preservation programs. When possible, MT SHPO tries to make small grants available to encourage the preservation of historic properties in Montana. The Bureau of Land Management provides a Catalog of Federal Domestic Assistance (CFDA) program which result in partnerships between local communities and the BLM to improve cultural, natural and recreational resources on or adjacent to BLM Lands. U.S. Department of Commerce

Economic Development Administration, (EDA)

The EDA provides funds for technical assistance, planning and the development of projects that result in the creation of new employment. Technical assistance grants usually average about \$25,000 and require a small cash match. Capital grants and revolving loan funds are available on a 50/50 matching basis and vary in size from hundreds of thousands to millions of dollars. EDA funds may be applied to economic development projects that make use of historic resources. The State Historic Preservation Office (SHPO) must review projects for compliance under the NHPA.

To help provide administrative aid to multi-county Economic Development Districts, Redevelopment Areas and Indian Tribes to establish and maintain economic development planning and implementation capability and thereby promote effective utilization of resources in the creation of full-time permanent jobs for the unemployed and the underemployed in areas of high distress.

To promote economic development and alleviate under- and unemployment in distressed areas, EDA operates a technical assistance program. The program provides funds to (1) enlist the resources of designated university centers in promoting economic development; (2) support innovative economic development projects; (3) disseminate information and studies of economic development issues of national significance; and (4) finance feasibility studies and other projects leading to local economic development.

Federal Forest Funds (PILT)

Under the "Secure Rural Schools and Community Self Determination Act of 2000," counties in Montana receive significant federal funding. In FY 2016, Lincoln County received \$635,059. County commissioners in each county have jurisdiction over how these funds are allocated. Under the Congressional funding formula, these funds are primarily applied to school improvements and road repairs; however, economic development efforts can also qualify for these funds. Often referred to as PILT (payment in lieu of taxes), these funds have diminished over time and many counties rely upon these funds to pay for essential services and operations.

Rural Community Assistance

(RCA) provides matching funds to communities for projects in rural economic development. Recipient communities must meet certain threshold requirements in the area of unemployment particularly as it relates to changes in the forest economy. Activities within RCA are carried out primarily through local Forest Service offices by channeling technical and financial assistance to local communities directly or through partner organizations. In addition to technical assistance, cost-sharing for community strategic planning and projects are an integral component of RCA. Funds are available annually; requests for proposals are issued in January with applications due in late winter.

National Preservation Loan Fund (NPLF)

The NPLF promotes the revitalization of commercial and industrial centers, the conservation of neighborhoods and rural communities, and the preservation of archaeological and maritime resources. Through the NPLF, the Trust provides financial and technical assistance to help preserve historic resources as well as strengthen the real estate development capabilities of recipient organizations. The Fund provides non-profit organizations and public agencies with low-interest loans, loan guarantees and lines of credit to help establish or expand local and statewide revolving funds and loan pools, and to undertake development projects involving historic buildings, sites and districts. The Fund also offers assistance for National Historic Landmarks (NHL) or properties that meet NHL criteria.

Preservation Services Fund (PSF)

PSF grants are intended to increase the flow of information and ideas in the field of preservation. They help stimulate public discussion, enable local groups to gain the technical expertise needed for particular projects, introduce students to preservation concepts, and encourage participation by the private sector in preservation. Eligible applicants must be non-profit organizations or public agencies and members of the NTHP Forum program. Maximum awards are \$5,000 and all grants must be matched on a dollar for dollar basis, using primarily cash contributions.

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Johanna Favrot Fund

This fund was established in 1994 to save historic environments across the United States and foster appreciation of our nation's diverse cultural heritage, and to preserve and revitalize the nation's communities. Eligible activities include hiring consultants in architecture, planning, economics, archaeology, fund raising, media relations, education, graphic design, organizational strengthening; sponsoring conferences and workshops; designing education programs. Application deadline is February 1.

Modernism + Recent Past Program

This newly-established grant program offers awards of up to \$7,000 to support efforts aimed at the preservation of historic places associated with the Modern design movement or dating from the recent past, i.e. less than 50 years old. Activities eligible for funding include historic preservation planning, research, education, outreach, survey and designation efforts, and capital improvements to historic resources. No match is required. Applications are accepted on a rolling basis, with review and determinations made within 30 days of receipt.

Montana History Foundation PRESERVE MONTANA FUND

The Montana History Foundation offers grants for up to \$10,000 for projects that preserve, restore, and interpret Montana's rich and important past. MHF funds projects in five categories: Buildings & Structures, Historic Cemeteries & Sacred Sites, Collections & Artifacts, Oral Histories, and Education & Outreach. MHF places an emphasis on heritage resources that are threatened or at risk, including bricks and mortar projects, preservation of fragile or damaged artifacts, and oral histories with elderly subjects. We also fund proposals that support ethnic and geographic diversity in Montana and projects that address important, unmet needs. A 25% cash or in-kind organizational match is required.

History Emergencies!

History Emergencies! provides funding to restore, conserve or repair historic resources that are a direct benefit to the community and in imminent danger. Awards of up to \$7,500 are available and require a 50% cash or in-kind organizational match.

Montana Conservation Corps

MCC is a non-profit organization that empowers youth and young adults through hands-on conservation service and education. Each season they enroll over 200 young adults from across the US, age 18 and up, in the AmeriCorps program, and more than 100 local teens, ages 15-17, in their Youth Service Expedition program.
